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Processes observed in rural areas of Europe



- 1. Out-migration & ageing
- 2. Population drift from more remote places into villages & towns
- → Closure of services
- → Threatening capacity for endogenous development
- 3. Diversification & restructuring
- 4. Changing infrastructure
- 5. Changing lifestyles

They interact with macroeconomic settings → societal segmentation

To address the challenges & use the opportunities:

Support small businesses & entrepreneurship (new business models); local, short food supply chains; infrastructure and services; valorising ecosystem services; bio-economy; exploit green spaces; digital growth; fiscal incentives; etc. & new collaborative actions — social innovation

Social innovation

... first & foremost is about quality of life & well-being...

... involves new social relationships & collaborations

... relates to governance mechanisms & economic opportunities...

... a mechanism to address sustainability & social justice

... considered crucial for smart & inclusive growth











In fields as diverse as energy, forestry, social farming, health care, tourism and conservation, social innovation is driving place-based rural development. In **Scotland, under the Government Strategic Research Programme (RESAS), and beyond, under H2020 SIMRA_EU,** we are investigating how social innovation arises, what drives its success and how it can address challenges in marginal rural areas.

Key objectives of our projects:

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To better understand social innovation (SI) & how to enhance it in agriculture, forestry & rural development

- Define, conceptualise & categorise SI
- Explain its variability & diversity
- Explain its triggers, enabling/success factors & challenges/barriers
- Develop knowledge to support SI, addressing specificities & priorities of social needs & new social relationships & collaborations









Social innovation



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...new ideas, products, services, models, Hutto arrangements, relationships, interactions (attitudes, collaborations, values, behaviours, skills, practices), fields of activity (social entrepreneurship & social enterprises), processes and changes designed to meet societal needs.

SI is "the reconfiguring of social practices, in response to societal challenges, which seeks to enhance outcomes on societal well-being and necessarily includes the engagement of civil society actors"

It begins with ideas, develops into prototypes and/or pilots, can become more stable, up-scale/out-scale/replicate & may create systemic changes





Social innovation in Braemar





- A village of 400 people
- The most remote village in Deeside
- Located in the Cairngorms National Park
- Often cut off by bad weather
- Earlier population decline
- Poor public services
- Needs to retain young people

- Grid connection problems
- Energy poverty
- Opportunities not pursued by private sector



What have they done?

- Established a community development trust (CDT) to oversee projects through feasibility studies & advising
- Exploited strong social capital a mix of local people & new incomers to create a vibrant community willing to innovate
- Each social enterprise is nurtured by the CDT & then becomes independent



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The Amal ('hope') project - socially integrating (150) Syrian refugees in Institute Aberdeenshire: a committee of 4 men & 4 women elected to enable families to contribute to the community on the concept of collective good & not for profit action. The ongoing SI initiatives:

- 'Kitchen' to provide the opportunity to cook Arabic & provide food, incl. to the newly arriving people & the community.
- 'Garden' -a place to mingle with locals at a garden/ allotment & practice language skills & build confidence for applying for work & integrate.









Practical challenges include:

- The way through? Dependence on volunteers. Their "fatigue"?
- SI communities victims of their success?
- Initial & matching funding? Adequate scale/size? How to foster SI?
- New relationships between citizens, communities, public-private bodies?

Expectations include improved understanding of:

- Challenges to communities, businesses & institutions
- Sustainable solutions to challenges
- Social innovation & how it can help revive communities
- Building capacities to promote SI & develop new relationships & collaborations to bring prosperity to rural areas

Now the pleasure boat is doubling as a passenger ferry and along with a sixcar ferry is operating between




SHIPMATES: Plockton High pupils are helped ashore after their trip on Sula Mhor.

- Covers people from nearby communities
- Challenges: secure funds to maintain/expand
